Annual Overview: Highlights 2024



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Introduction

LeidenGlobal is dedicated to strengthening the understanding of human cultures and societies across the world. To achieve this, we connect researchers, cultural and academic institutions, social organisations, government partners, businesses, and citizens, bringing together Leiden's wide range of expertise.

Supported by Leiden's world-class museum and library collections, as well as the renowned scholarship found in the academic and cultural institutes, Leiden has earned an international reputation as a leading centre for the study of global cultures. LeidenGlobal builds on this foundation to increase the societal impact of this knowledge. Through cultural events, public discussions, educational initiatives, and research collaborations, LeidenGlobal deepens understanding and insight into the world's many cultures and the ways in which they interact.

As an open platform, LeidenGlobal also showcases Leiden's unique concentration of knowledge and experience to audiences both in the Netherlands and abroad, ensuring that this rich heritage continues to inspire, inform, and connect people worldwide.

The year of 2024 brought some change for LeidenGlobal, including the relocation of the LeidenGlobal office as well as the move of several of our partner institutions to the Herta Mohr Building in Leiden. Located at 'the Witte Singel', the Herta Mohr Building now houses the Leiden University Faculty of Humanities, the African Studies Centre, the Netherlands Institute for the Near East, the Royal Netherlands Institute of Southeast Asian and Caribbean Studies, and the International Institute for Asian Studies. This relocation brings the partners and LeidenGlobal closer together, strengthens connections and makes collaboration more efficient and accessible.

It was also the year in which LeidenGlobal launched an important flash campaign in collaboration with its partners, designed to highlight the research taking place at the knowledge institutes and the impact it has on society, and to show policy makers and the public the importance of this research.

New directions were explored in communication, on the website as well as the social media presence, such as the launch of a LinkedIn page to strengthen the professional network. In addition, a dedicated webpage was created to showcase LeidenGlobal's larger projects. This new "Initiatives" platform brings together the Leiden City World Walks, podcasts, exhibitions, and reports from the Current Affairs Lectures, offering a clear overview of the most important activities and their societal relevance.

A. Impact through LeidenGlobal Initiatives

LeidenGlobal created a lot of societal impact through the development, coordination, participation, and implementation of a wide range of activities and events. Working in collaboration with partner organisations, LeidenGlobal successfully brought these initiatives to a broad and diverse audience.

1. Current Affairs Lectures

After starting the Current Affairs lectures in 2023 at the Rijksmuseum van Oudheden, LeidenGlobal continued the series in 2024 at the Public Library 'BplusC' in Leiden. The *Leiden Current Affairs Lecture* (het Leids Actualiteitencollege) is a LeidenGlobal initiative in which experts give brief background information on current issues related to specific regions and cultures. Each lecture includes plenty of time for audience questions and knowledge exchange. The lectures are moderated by Prof. Remco Breuker, unless stated otherwise.

In 2024, all current affairs lectures were organised in collaboration not only with LeidenGlobal experts but also with Public Library BplusC Leiden and Leiden Kennisstad, and for some sessions with an additional partner:

- **Back from the past: North Korea as an international arms supplier**

1 February 2024
Prof. Remco Breuker (Leiden University) provided insights into North Korea's notable return to the international arms trade, followed by interaction with the public. Moderation by Floris Harm (Leiden Asia Centre). This lecture was co-organised with the Leiden Asia Centre.

Prof. Patricio Silva (Leiden University) spoke about the alarming increase in violence in Ecuador, mainly due to drug smuggling and trafficking in the country. He explored the history behind the rise of drug trafficking in Ecuador and its impact on the Netherlands, particularly through illegal trade via Dutch ports.

- **Taiwan: The Next Geopolitical Flashpoint?**
[Taiwan: de volgende geopolitieke brandhaard?]
21 November 2024
Dr. Casper Wits (Leiden University) discussed the conflict between Taiwan and China and the growing fear of a Chinese invasion with global consequences. Since Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Taiwan has drawn growing international attention. Many fear China could seek to absorb Taiwan in a similar way, but while China claims Taiwan as its territory, it is pursuing its own timeline.

RESULT:

The current affairs lectures have been well attended, with 25 to 30 participants in the first two sessions, and over 40 participants in the autumn sessions. Among those present were students, library visitors, journalists, policy makers from municipal and national affairs and other interested parties. 2. Leiden City World Walks

Throughout 2024

The Leiden City World Walks have become a permanent part of the LeidenGlobal programme. The World Walks started in 2022: research by several experts and their students highlights traces of the past and diverse cultural influences in Leiden. These texts, together with photos and maps, were compiled into free, downloadable PDFs to create a personalised tour in Leiden, focussing on different themes. They are also offered as guided, in-person tours.

In 2024 LeidenGlobal produced a poster and flyer advertising the free walk downloads, each featuring a QR code linking straight to the walks on the website. The posters were distributed throughout university buildings and several partner organisations, along with the flyers. The flyers were also given a spot at the Leiden tourist information point. For the second print, run in the autumn, also an English-language version of the flyer was produced, specifically for the tourist information point.

RESULT

Attendance at the walks varies. The *Traces of Poetry* and *Slavery* walks usually receive many registrations. However, for the *Traces of the Middle East* walk only a few participants (of a fully booked walk) showed up. The Leiden tourist office occasionally requests an extra batch of flyers, showing that visitors are indeed taking them.

3. Symposium: A conversation with KIMSOOJA

1 March 2024

LeidenGlobal collaborated with Museum De Lakenhal and Leiden University to organise a symposium with leading experts to mark the opening of the exhibition 'Thread Roots' of globally known artist Kimsooja.

During the expert meeting, the audience was introduced to Kimsooja's artistic journey, which weaves together themes of migration, mobility, and belonging. At the expert meeting, the public learned about the art journey of Kimsooja, exploring migration, mobility, and a sense of home. Curators Nicole Roepers (Museum De Lakenhal), Amanda Pinatih (Stedelijk Museum Amsterdam) and Keumhwa Kim (independent, Berlin), who all have worked with Kimsooja, gave introductory talks exploring the complex connections between textile arts and historical Asian collections. After the introduction, a conversation was held with Kimsooja, led by art historian and emeritus professor Kitty Zijlmans.

RESULT

A well-attended event featuring discussions on a variety of topics. About 70 visitors: students from different fields (arts university, Korean studies, philosophy), researchers, art historians, and other interested people.

4. Workshop: 'Crossing Borders: Navigating communication challenges for Freedom & Security'

for International Women's Day in Leiden

10 March 2024

For the celebration of International Women's Day, prof. Marina Terkourafi and Tatiana Boiko organised a LeidenGlobal workshop: Freedom and refugees: How do refugees get a voice? In this workshop participants shared personal stories to understand successes and challenges in cross-border communication and to understand how refugees and non-refugees can feel safe and free. The workshop was part of an event at Stadhuis Leiden, organised by Stichting Vrouwenennetwerk Leiden, featuring a total of 15 workshops.

The workshop was fully booked with a total of 20 participants and is well received.

5. Campaign: The Crucial Role of Research

Dozens of LeidenGlobal experts and university scientists highlighted the importance of academic research for the Netherlands and Dutch prosperity. At Lunch talks in The Hague and Leiden and in short films, they presented their research and its societal impact to policymakers, journalists, and the public the severe consequences of cutting academic budgets in clear, understandable language.

During lunchtime, researchers explained the importance of their field in just 15 minutes, highlighting why their work is invaluable to society. After each presentation, the audience had the opportunity to ask questions. RESULT:

The Lunch Talks were well attended especially in Leiden, and many people learned more detailed information about the research. The campaign also gained strong attention on social media, both for the talks themselves as well as for the video recordings.

6. Signature Event: Should Nature be given Rights

30 September 2024

The Royal Netherlands Institute of Southeast Asian and Caribbean Studies (KITLV) and the Institute of Cultural Anthropology of Leiden University's Faculty of Social Sciences (CADS) jointly organised LeidenGlobal's annual event on the Rights of Nature, featuring experts from various backgrounds: Law, Anthropology, and the Humanities.

The idea that nature should have legal rights is globally growing in popularity. However, a question remains: is giving legal rights to nature the best way to improve our relationship with the environment? This matter led to a Masterclass and panel discussion at the LeidenGlobal Annual Event.

The event consisted of:

1. **Masterclass: 'Defending Nature's Rights: Paradoxes and Challenges'** for PhD and (Research) MA students. The Masterclass was held at KITLV (Herta Mohr building) and led by Shivant Jhagroe (Leiden University) and Diana Vela Almeida (Utrecht University).
2. **Panel Discussion: 'Should Nature Be Given Rights?'** for a broad public audience, held at and in collaboration with the Wereldmuseum Leiden. The discussion was moderated by David Kloos (KITLV) and Marja Spierenberg (CADS), with panellists Shivant Jhagroe (Leiden University), Erna Lilje (Wereldmuseum Leiden), Bernardo Ribeiro de Almeida (VVI, Leiden University), Diana Suhardiman (KITLV, Leiden University), Diana Vela Almeida (Utrecht University).

RESULT

Of the initial 15 registrations for the Masterclass, 8 graduate students attended the session. At the panel discussion 45 attendees ultimately joined the event (on this very rainy afternoon) of the original 90 registered participants. It was an engaging discussion structured around three statements, offering deeper insight into the topic from multiple disciplinary perspectives.

7. LeidenGlobal Exhibitions

- **Crafting Cultures** on display online
Online since 13 March 2024
Since spring 2024, the LeidenGlobal exhibition 'Crafting Cultures' is [available online](#). This exhibition explores how tradition meets innovation, showcasing Leiden scholars' work where craft drives progress and offers hope for future generations.
- **Heritage on the Move** on display at the opening of the Herta Mohr Building
8 October 2024
LeidenGlobal's first exhibition, showcasing photographs that visualize academic research on migration and heritage, was presented once more to a broad audience. This time during the opening of the Herta Mohr building.

8. Graduate Courses

- **Methodologies in the Social Sciences and the Humanities**
February-May 2024
The interdisciplinary graduate course Methodologies, coordinated by Maaïke Warnaar (Leiden University), took place in spring 2024. Ten Research Master students and thirteen PhD candidates successfully completed the course.

RESULT

A total of 23 students joined the course, of which 10 Research MA students and 13 PhD candidates. The course was evaluated by the participants and received positive feedback. The participants who completed the full program, received a certificate.

- **Beyond Discipline and Place in the Social Sciences and the Humanities**
September-December 2024
For the second time, Dr. Noa Schonmann (Leiden University) coordinated the lecture series. Despite extensive outreach efforts, recruitment proved challenging. Given the low number of participants this year, individual lectures were also offered and promoted separately, enabling students to attend selected sessions without formal registration. The lectures were given by Alex Gekker (LU Centre for the Arts in Society - LIAS), Joseph Sony Jean (KITLV), Elena Burgos Martinez (LU Institute of Area Studies), Maartje van der Woude (Institute for the Interdisciplinary Study of the Law), Remco Breuker (LIAS), Carwyn Morris (LIAS), Cristiana Strava (LIAS).

RESULT

A total of 7 to 8 participants registered, consisting of both PhD and Research Master students. At the end six participants completed the course, of which four are PhD candidates and two are Research Master Students. No extra students participated in the individual lectures. The course did receive positive evaluations from the few students that attended. Students particularly appreciated hearing from speakers with diverse backgrounds and perspectives each week, which they found both interesting and useful.

B. Impact by Communication

LeidenGlobal uses several communication channels to share and promote Leiden’s cultural knowledge. Online outreach is considered central: the website offers background information, news, activities, and expert profiles, while Instagram, X (Twitter), Facebook, and Bluesky feature daily updates.

In 2024 LeidenGlobal explored new directions in its communication strategy, both on the website and across social media. An essential step was the launch of a LinkedIn page in November, designed to strengthen the organisation’s professional network and to connect more effectively with partners, experts, and a wider academic audience. This shift also responded to a noticeable drop in followers on X around the time of the American elections.

In addition, LeidenGlobal introduced a dedicated webpage to highlight its major projects. This “Initiatives” platform brings together the Leiden City World Walks, podcasts, exhibitions, and reports from the Current Affairs Lectures, offering a clear and accessible overview of key activities and their societal relevance.

Other sources of communication include the MOMO-app, developed by and for the student community, on which periodically LeidenGlobal highlights its own activities as well as those of the partners. And LeidenGlobal continues to reach out to the public by promoting events and calls through posters and flyers.

Besides, LeidenGlobal distributes a bimonthly newsletter to keep its network informed of recent developments, upcoming activities, and key initiatives. When appropriate, the newsletter mailing list is additionally used to share targeted invitations to events, ensuring that partners and subscribers remain closely connected and engaged.

Facts & Figures



Facebook, Bluesky and X

LeidenGlobal maintains an active presence across multiple social media platforms. The organisation posts daily activities or updates on LeidenGlobal (partner) initiatives on Facebook, Bluesky and X.

Since November 2024, platform X experienced a significant decline in its overall user base (after the US elections), which also effected LeidenGlobal’s account. Whereas LeidenGlobal had 2,519 followers

in October 2024, this number had decreased to 2,442 by 31 December 2024. In contrast, Bluesky, which was initially launched in 2023, saw substantial user growth since November of 2024. Consequently, LeidenGlobal increased its posting frequency on the Bluesky platform.

LinkedIn

LeidenGlobal created a LinkedIn account in late November 2024. Starting in December, the organisation published three posts per week. Within one month, the LinkedIn account gained 123 followers.

Instagram

Each week, LeidenGlobal posts a story on Instagram featuring 5-6 events organised by LeidenGlobal and partners, giving an overview of activities in Leiden. In addition, LeidenGlobal shares one dedicated post per week that features a specific activity, interview, or call to action. These posts are usually accompanied by a corresponding story on the same topic to increase engagement. As of 31 December 2024, LeidenGlobal had 818 Instagram followers, with an average monthly reach of 1,229 unique accounts.

Newsletter and Expert Interviews

LeidenGlobal sends a newsletter to its network every two months. In addition to covering news, activities, and exhibitions, the regular newsletters highlight research by Leiden experts that may receive less public attention but is highly relevant. C. Collaboration

D. Organisation

The LeidenGlobal Board

The LeidenGlobal Board consists of representatives from its partner institutions and oversees the organisation's overall activities and strategic direction. The board is chaired by Professor Remco Breuker, who provides guidance on the day-to-day management of the organisation.

In 2024, the Board met four times (19 January, 21 May, 24 October and 13 December) to review LeidenGlobal's policies and performance, discuss key strategic matters, evaluate ongoing projects, and provide input on new project proposals.

During its fourth meeting, the Board focused on the development of the new strategy for 2025–2029. Members offered their insights and recommendations to help shape the next strategic plan, as the current strategy is formally approved and funded only until 31 October 2025. This process ensures that LeidenGlobal's activities continue to align with its long-term goals and the interests of its partner institutions.

The LeidenGlobal Team

LeidenGlobal is supported by a manager (Aphroditi Zoulfoukaridis, 0.6 fte) who plays a central role in developing the organisation's policies and activities and is responsible for day-to-day operations. This includes coordinating all LeidenGlobal activities, establishing partnerships, overseeing communication strategy, managing financial administration, and carrying out organisational tasks. The manager maintains regular contact with the chairperson to discuss LeidenGlobal's activities and policies.

The project assistant (0.4 fte) supports the manager, particularly in graduate courses, the Leiden City World Walks, exhibitions, and other knowledge valorisation projects. In 2024, two project assistants were employed: Isa Lefering (who filled this position from 1 December '23 until 1 April '24), and Annemay Slijkkoord, who joined the team on 1 April 2024.

In 2024, LeidenGlobal was supported by several interns (0.6 fte), who primarily focused on online communication, project support, and conducting expert interviews. Sharon Sterke began her internship on 15 January, initially planned for 5.5 months; however, due to unforeseen circumstances, her internship concluded on 1 April. Florence Bellemont joined shortly thereafter, serving from 1 May to 15 July. She was succeeded by Eline Raukema, who started on 1 September for a five-month period.
